Morning Workshop: Fostering Healthy Development in Young Children
(3 CEUS designed to meet AZBBHE requirement for ethics/law)

Judy Krysik, MSW, Ph.D.

Dr. Judy Krysik is an Associate Professor at Arizona State University of Social Work where she also coordinates the PhD Program. A former CPS worker, she specializes in the delivery and evaluation of prevention services to children and families and is a Board Member of Prevent Child Abuse Arizona. She is the co-author of two books and has published several articles and book chapters. She lives in Avondale with her husband and 9-year old twins.

This interactive workshop will explore what young children need to maximize their potential for healthy development. It will examine the concept of discipline, and explore beliefs and research in a framework of social work ethics. Participants will learn about child abuse reporting laws and what to expect when reporting a suspected case of child abuse and neglect. Participants will leave the workshop with resources and skills to assist adults with the roles they play in fostering healthy development in the early childhood years.

Anita Royal

Ms. Royal attended Arizona State University School of Social Work and received her MSW from the esteemed institution in 1979. Thereafter, in 1980 she commenced her legal education at the University of Arizona, College of Law and was awarded her juris doctor in 1983. She is licensed to practice law in both Arizona and Georgia. Presently, Ms. Royal serves as the Pima County Public Fiduciary and as an Adjunct Professor at her alma mater, University of Arizona, James R. Roger College of Law. During the past two decades, Ms. Royal has developed and taught courses for both social worker and law students and practitioners. Most notably, she is an expert and regular presenter on a variety of subject areas including social work ethics, prudent and malpractice, fiduciary practice and professional liability.

The primary goals of this interactive seminar are two-fold. First, to educate and demystify for social work practitioners legal/court processes, including litigation, pre-trial discovery and depositions, subpoenas and in-court testimony. Secondly, this seminar will provide participants with an overview of prudent practices to avoid and prevent malpractice and potential litigation.

The presenter will provide participants with concrete examples of areas of potential malpractice in daily practice from a risk management perspective.

Cynthia Lietz is currently on faculty at the School of Social Work at ASU. She teaches research and practice courses in the BSW and MSW programs. She has worked with the Latino community to develop and implement service programs that meet their needs. Her research examines Latino family well-being and this population's interactions with systems of care.

A theoretical framework for practice with Mexican immigrant families will be utilized to address factors that promote and hinder Mexican family well-being; and, to examine a wide range of issues that social workers may face when working with such families. The workshop format includes lecture, discussion, and small group activities.
