Characteristics and Predictors of Self-Mutilation

Dr. Roe-Sepowitz is an Assistant Professor in the School of Social Work at ASU. Her work has focused on adult and juvenile delinquency and mental health with specific focus on girl sex offenders, homicide offenses and arson/fire setting behaviors. She has presented at numerous conferences on trauma, self-harm, women and the sex industry, juvenile sex offenders and treatment of offenders.

Workshop Description: This workshop will explain and explore the features and characteristics common to self-mutilating behaviors of youth and adults. Techniques for intervention are discussed as well as self-awareness for the therapist/social worker.

Second Hand Shock: Vicarious Trauma and Its Treatment

Ellie Izzo, PhD, LPC: Ellie has more than 30 years experience as a therapist, author, and public speaker. She is the author of The Bridge to I Am: Rapid Advance Psychotherapy and with Vicki Carpel Miller, co-author of Second Hand Shock: Vicarious Trauma and Its Treatment and Aftershock: the Workbook. She serves as Psychology Advisor to AZ Teen Magazine.

Vicki Carpel Miller, BSN, MS, LMFT: Vicki has been in private practice for over eighteen years. She and Ellie Izzo are co-authors of Second Hand Shock: Vicarious Trauma and Its Treatment and Aftershock: the Workbook. Vicki is also internationally known as a pioneer in Collaborative Divorce.

Workshop Description: Do you feel unsettled with some of your clients? Do you feel that your level of confidence is less than it used to be? Do you have an emptiness in the pit of your stomach at the end of your work day? If so, you may be suffering from Vicarious Trauma: a transformation in the helper's inner sense of identity and existence that results from utilizing controlled empathy when listening to clients' traumatic stories; a set of cognitive emotional physical and spiritual disturbances that result from helping trauma survivors. This workshop will be an educational resource for all people in the helping professions. It will help the audience to recognize, assess and address the symptoms of Vicarious Trauma.

Workshop Description: Social Work in rural America and in particular Arizona has changed dramatically over the last 20 years. The demographics of the clients served have changed, as has technology and yet in rural communities the sociocultural and sociopolitical climate of social work practice has remained the same. This workshop will examine the current cultural, political and ethical consideration of social work practice in rural communities.

Social Work with Native Americans in the Urban Environment

Veronica Boone (Navajo/Laguna) has a Bachelors Degree in Family Studies from the University of Arizona and a Masters of Social Work degree from Arizona State University. She has previously coordinated and conducted Native American Talking Circles for women and youth, been a Child Welfare Specialist for tribal CPS program, and is currently the Social Services Director for the Tucson Indian Center.

Sascha T. Navarro is a member of the Tohono O'odham Nation and lives on the San Xavier Reservation. She graduated with a B.A. in American Studies and Spanish from Smith College and is completing her first year in the MSW program, Tucson Component. As an intern at the Tucson Indian Center she is experiencing the uniqueness of social work with urban Indians, hoping to work with at-risk adolescents, specifically Native and LGBT youth.

Workshop Description: The unique demands of working with Native American clients in the urban setting will be presented in a cultural, historical and social context. Issues of cultural competency in implementing prevention and intervention programs, understanding the urban Native family experience and addressing methods of Native resiliency when creating and facilitating client treatment plans will be considered.

Beyond Awareness: The Nuances of Social Work Practice With Latino Families

This month he is celebrating 30 years as a social worker. He received his MSW in 1978 from the University of Houston. During the span of his thirty years in practice he began his career at Clínica de Consulta Familiar in Houston, Texas. He has worked with families with children who are disabled, families caring for their elderly and families with issues of alcohol, substance abuse and HIV. He has published several articles on Cultural Competence with Hispanic Families.

Workshop Description: Contemporary Latino families require a great deal of sophistication in order to work competently within their structure and how they function. Multiple types of Latino families include single, blended, alternative families and traditional families. The stressors of a post-industrial society have greatly impacted some families that cling to a family structure and function of the past two centuries. Using Mexican and Latino cinema the presenter will discuss how to work with immigrant families, families impacted by AIDS, LGBT families and a discussion of gender roles and the impact of poverty and violence on behavior.

El principio del siglo veinte y uno trae consigo mismo múltiples clases de familias. Entre ellas familias de madres solteras, familias mixtas, familias alternativas tanto como las familias tradicionales de siempre. El estrés de la sociedad post-industrial ha causado múltiples retos a familias que se atacan a la estructura y funcionamiento de familias de los dos siglos pasados. Este taller utilizara películas Mexicanas y Latinas para ilustrar trabajo social con familias inmigrantes, familias enfrentando el SIDA, familias de personas Gay, Lesbianas, Bisexuales y Transexuales, igual como las familias tradicionales. Se discutirán el desarrollo de los géneros masculinos y femeninos tanto como el impacto de la pobreza y violencia sobre el comportamiento de individuos.
